Ord. #2026-08 An Ordinance Amending Chapter 7, Traffic, Article IV, Paid Parking Zones/Parking Meters, of the Code of the Township of Lower, To Authorize the Issuance of Seasonal Parking Permits. This is the second reading and public hearing of this Ordinance. This Ordinance has been posted, published and made available to the public.

Deputy Mayor Coombs made a motion to amend the Ordinance to affix stickers on golf carts. Seconded by Councilmember Wareham.

Solicitor Belasco suggested amending Chapter 7-37A, Seasonal Parking Permits.

Mayor Sippel mentioned that the parking permits were put into place at the request of the residents. Mayor mentioned it is one of the lowest rates for parking permits.

Susan Woska-Peterson, 205 Madison Ave, expressed concerns about parking meters in front of their houses.

Mayor clarified that this comment period is only for parking permits not parking meters.

Carmine Axmann- 211 E Raleigh Ave, Discusses the \$250 permits amidst having a \$10 million dollars in surplus, feels this is discriminatory towards Diamond Beach residents, Suggests no fees for the parking permits for the homeowners in Diamond beach

Kelly Scardone, 227 E Raleigh Ave, asks for free parking permit, and asks to change the parking hours to 9am-5pm, addresses concerns with congestion, safety, availability, referred to an article in the Herald, asked for free parking pass and reduced parking hours

Robert P., 400 E Raleigh Ave, agrees with fellow residents, suggests permits for property owners only adjacent to the meters, asks that only full-time residents should be given permits

Bob Resinski, The Grand, Diamond Beach, expressed that the beaches are privately owns, discusses the cost of beach maintenance, does not support the parking meters or permits.

Mayor informs the public that this is not a question-and-answer period and Council may comment at the end of the meeting.

Ted Rose, 212 Raleigh Ave, mentioned he hasn't seen residents this upset in a long time, feels that it will create more problems, feels they cannot compare to another town since they do not have boardwalks, restaurants etc., disappointed in the notification process, feels that Diamond Beach is targeted since they are not putting these meters at the bay or lighthouse, suggests changing parking hours to 9-5 and asks for free passes to residents.

Lisa Heckman, 407A E Raleigh Ave, concerned how the golf cart stickers are going to be transferrable, upset they are being charged to park in front of their own homes, they should take into consideration all the kids who park there to work at the hotel.

Patty Reger, Seapointe, thanked all the residents for coming out, hopes mayor and council hear what they are saying, hears their concerns and will take it into consideration

Lou Konrad, 400 E Raleigh Ave, Unit 404, asked mayor and council to take care of their own and not to compare them to other towns, inquired if they are planning on taking over the beaches, concerned about the schools.

Cindy Rouchard, 400 E Raleigh Ave, discusses how she felt it was not handled well, feels mayor and council should do their due diligence to protect their residents, expresses concerns with traffic and the studies that have or have not been done, concerned on how this will affect the townships relationship with the Crest

Mayor reiterated that this is comment only for Ordinance #2026-08

Joe Flaky, 316 South Station, concerned about the fees already paid in taxes and asks mayor and council to give free parking permits to local residents.

Elizabeth Ludwig, 431 E Raleigh Ave, they already pay for the beaches feels they should not have to pay for parking. Mayor Sippel closed public comment and asked solicitor to provide guidance.

Solicitor Belasco explains it is an equal access issue, streets are public and everyone has right to park there, expresses that Lower Township does not own the beach, explains that everyone has the right to park there and everyone has equal opportunity to park there and access the beach and opens it for everyone to obtain a parking permit also explains it is only limited to residents in Lower Township only equal to all. He also explains the local notification laws and explains how an ordinance is introduced and has hearings prior to being approved. Explains the publication of notices and how the law states using a newspaper that is printed and published within the municipality. He also explains the state law changed and how the Township is required to publish on the township's websites. States that the Township fully complied with the publications of notices.

Mayor explains how transparent the Township is, offers how the Township videos all meetings and posts them online for residents.

Engineer Report

Andrew McTague, DeBlasio & Assoc., gave Council a briefing on the Capital Project's within the Township. He commented on the Rotary Community Park renovations, Bay outfall extensions Phase 1&2, David Douglass Memorial Park Renovations, Lower Township Public Works Building Design, The Lower Township Municipal Pool building, resurfacing of various streets. He mentioned the Bayshore Rd pickleball courts completion, and Diamond beach various streets are being resurfaced.

Call to the Public

Dave Fascione, 301 South Station, asked for clarification that they passed the ordinance, feels that they were not heard.

Mayo Sippel explained that they did listen and took notes on all comments made, he also explained that they can always go back and change or amend the ordinances.

Susan Peterson, 205 Madison Ave, asks Mayor and Council to each stand and state when their term expires. Solicitor Belasco explains that information is available on The Townships website.

Jerry Petraglia, 320 South Station, asking for consideration, explains he is a disabled vet, expresses concerns over problems this will cause, encourages everyone to work together and make some considerations.

Kathy Shenton, 215 Dune Dr, discusses process, fairness and trust between Mayor, Council and residents of Diamond Beach, questions why they are not putting meters elsewhere in the Township, explains the residents are now paying attention.

Ted Rose, 212 Raleigh Ave, questioned why you don't have to pay to park anywhere else in the Township, suggests the Township purchase a building in Diamond Beach for EMT services.

Phyllis Sockwell, Memphis Ave, has a problem with these meters, asks for more handicap parking and expressed concern with disappearing businesses and too many condos.

Lisa DeLizio, 218 South Station, stated that the Township can limit the parking compared to North Jersey, doesn't think they should open it to all Township residents, and believes the passes should be by street.

Solicitor Belasco again explained that the parking is equal opportunity for all Township residents.

Carmine Axmann, 211 E Raleigh Ave, expressed concern of how these parking meters and signs will destroy the natural look of Diamond Beach, concerned of the eye sore, inquired of the letter the Mayor of Wildwood Crest wrote.

Roberto Parota, 400 E Raleigh Ave, asked mayor and council to get rid of the ordinance all together, asks for other forms of notification by either email or phone calls, asks mayor and council to please take their concerns into consideration.

Bob Rabinski, 9600 Atlantic Ave, the Grand, asked for a clearer process, mentioned the Grand has 125 owners which may all want permits, expresses concerns over availability.

Lisa Hickman, Raleigh Ave, suggested making it equal and putting meters throughout the Township, mentioned the possibility of Diamond Beach leaving Lower Township.

Cindy Rushardi, 409 E Raleigh Ave, feels that it was a waste of time coming, inquired about information being truthful.

Lisa Ferante, 210 Jefferson Ave, concerned the meters will cause more parking issues, concerned over more condos going up and less parking.

Jerry Petraglia, 320 South Station, concerned over parking spots, concerned over the effect of property values.

Mayor closed public portion and asked Solicitor to explain how Planning and Zoning works.

Solicitor Belasco explained the differences between the Planning and Zoning Boards, he also described the different variances in which people can apply for, he went into length about how changes are approved.

Council Comments

Councilmember Conrad – no comments

Councilmember Wareham - We are listening and taking notes, expressed that the engineer reports show the amount of work being done in the Township.

Councilmember Roy acknowledged the concerns, believes some people have been misinformed, explained how the Township is in contract with Wildwood Crest to help provide EMS services to Diamond Beach, Council will work things out and thanked residents for expressing their concerns.

Deputy Mayor Coombs, agreed with Councilmember Roy, mentioned that they have a lot to think about.

Mayor Sippel explained that the township has been evaluating the parking issues in Diamond Beach since October 2025, residents were posting illegal no parking signs, the Township has brought properties into compliance, mentioned Seapointe Village had illegal meters in a public right of way, they were notified and meters have been removed. Mayor also mentioned the state aide agreement that Lower Township entered, nothing has been done with that project yet, he asked the solicitor to explain.

Solicitor Belasco explained the state aide beach protection project, the provisions within the agreement to obtain easements, explained what that would mean for the township and the process to obtain said easements. To date the process is currently on hold.

Mayor Sippel thanked everyone for coming out and will take everything into consideration.

Adjournment

There being no further business to address, motion to adjourn moved by Mayor, seconded by Councilmember Wareham. Motion to adjourn was unanimous. Meeting adjourned at 6:49 p.m.

WHEREAS, the Township Council of the Township of Lower is a public body organized under the laws of the State of New Jersey which conducts open public meetings subject to the provisions of the New Jersey Open Public Meetings Act, N.J.S.A. 10:4-6 et seq.; and

WHEREAS, in accordance with the New Jersey Open Public Meetings Act, specifically N.J.S.A. 10:4-12(a), the Township Council is required to set aside a portion of every public meeting, the length of which shall be determined by Township Council, for public comment on governmental issues that a member of the public feels may be of concern to the residents of the Township; and

WHEREAS, N.J.S.A. 10:4-12(a) further provides that nothing in the Open Public Meetings Act shall be construed to limit the discretion of a public body to permit, prohibit, or regulate the active participation of the public at any meeting; and

WHEREAS, the Township Council values the comments and participation of Township residents and members of the public during Township Council meetings; and

WHEREAS, the Township Council desires to establish reasonable, uniform, and viewpoint-neutral rules governing public comment and public participation in order to promote orderly meetings, preserve decorum, allow Township business to proceed efficiently, and ensure that members of the public who wish to address Township Council have a fair and equal opportunity to do so; and

WHEREAS the Township Council finds it necessary and appropriate to establish reasonable time limits and rules of decorum for individual public comments during its public meetings.

NOW THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED, by the Township Council of the Township of Lower, County of Cape May, State of New Jersey as follows:

1. Public comment on agenda items and general issues affecting the Township and/or its residents shall be limited to three (3) minutes for each member of the public. The time limit may be waived or modified by the Mayor for good cause and in a viewpoint neutral manner.
2. Public comment is intended to provide members of the public with an opportunity to address items on the agenda and other matters related to Township government, business, services, or issues of concern to Township residents. Public comment is not intended to be a question-and-answer period. Any response by Township Council, Township officials, or Township professionals shall be discretionary.
3. Each member of the public shall be recognized by the Mayor before speaking. Members of the public shall address their comments to Township Council as a body and not to individual members of Council, Township officials, Township employees, or members of the public. Each member of the public shall step to the podium provided for public comment and shall state their name and address, the organization, if any, that they represent, and, if during the open public session of the meeting, the subject they wish to discuss. Children under eighteen (18) years of age shall not be required to state their last name or address.
4. Members of the public who provide comments during public comment portions of the meeting shall do so in an orderly manner. Township officials, Township employees, and members of the public are expected to conduct themselves with civility and to accord one another dignity and respect.
5. No person at a meeting shall engage in disorderly, boisterous, disruptive, or threatening conduct, including shouting, interrupting others, refusing to yield the floor when directed, harassment, the utterance of physically threatening, patently offensive, or abusive language, or any other conduct that actually

disrupts, disturbs, or impedes the orderly conduct of the meeting or the ability of the public to hear or participate.

6. The Mayor may limit or conclude a member of the public's comments if the comments exceed the allotted time, become unduly repetitive, are not germane to Township business or issues within the jurisdiction of Township Council, or otherwise violate these rules, provided that such rules are applied in a viewpoint neutral manner and the member of the public has been afforded a fair opportunity to be heard.
7. In the event that a large number of persons wish to comment on the same issue or express substantially similar comments, such persons are encouraged, but not required, to designate a spokesperson. Nothing herein shall prohibit individual members of the public from speaking, subject to the time limits and rules of decorum set forth herein.
8. A member of the public may not yield unused time to another member of the public unless permitted by the Mayor.
9. If, in the judgment of the Mayor or Township Council, the public comment period becomes unusually lengthy, unduly repetitive, unruly, or unmanageable, Township Council may limit, close, continue, or defer all or a portion of the public comment period to a subsequent regular meeting or to an advertised special meeting, as deemed necessary and appropriate and consistent with applicable law.
10. The Mayor may rule a person out of order for violating these rules. A person who is ruled out of order shall be given an opportunity to comply with these rules, unless immediate action is necessary to preserve order or protect the safety of persons present.
11. Any person who continues to disrupt, disturb, or impede the orderly conduct of the meeting after being warned by the Mayor may be directed to leave the meeting. If such person refuses to leave or continues the disruptive conduct, the Mayor may request that law enforcement remove the person from the meeting room.
12. If a meeting is disturbed or disrupted in such a manner as to make the restoration of order infeasible or improbable, the Mayor or a majority of Township Council may recess, adjourn, or continue the meeting, and any remaining business may be considered at the next regular meeting or at an advertised special meeting, as appropriate and consistent with applicable law.
13. These rules shall be administered and enforced in a viewpoint neutral manner. Nothing herein shall be construed to prohibit public criticism of Township Council, Township officials, Township employees, Township professionals, or Township policies, provided that such comments are made in compliance with the time limits and rules of decorum set forth herein.
14. This Resolution shall take effect immediately upon adoption.

THIS PROFESSIONAL SERVICES AGREEMENT (the "Agreement") is made this ____ day of _____, 2026, by and between the **TOWNSHIP OF LOWER** (the "Township"), a municipal corporation of the State of New Jersey whose administrative offices are located at 2600 Bayshore Road, Villas, New Jersey 08251, and **WGH CONSULTING LLC** (the "Consultant") a New Jersey Limited Liability Company whose offices are located at 136 Pennsylvania Avenue, Woodbine, New Jersey 08270, who may collectively be denominated as the "Parties" in this Agreement, and each may be called, separately, a "Party."

1. Award of Professional Services Contract

This Agreement is awarded as a professional services contract pursuant to the New Jersey Local Public Contracts Law, N.J.S.A. 40A:11-1 et seq., and is subject to approval by Resolution by the Township Council of the Township of Lower. Consultant acknowledges that this Agreement is subject to all applicable requirements of New Jersey Local Public Contracts Law, including without limitation all disclosure, registration, certification, pay-to-play, and compliance requirements applicable to professional services contracts.

2. Scope of Services

The Consultant shall provide grant management and support services as well as related professional consulting services to the Township, including but not limited to:

- a. Identification and research of federal, state, foundation, and other grant opportunities;
- b. Preparation and development of grant applications, including supporting documentation and submission coordination;
- c. Post-award grant administration support, including compliance monitoring, reporting assistance, and coordination with funding agencies;
- d. Stakeholder engagement and project coordination related to grant-funded initiatives; and
- e. Other grant-related consulting services as authorized by the Township Manager or designee.

Services shall be substantially consistent with Consultant's proposal dated April 15, 2026, which is incorporated herein by reference, except to the extent inconsistent with the terms of this Agreement, in which case the terms of this Agreement shall control. Consultant shall not perform services outside the authorized scope of work or incur charges in excess of the compensation limit set forth herein unless approved in advance by Resolution of the Township governing body.

3. Term

This Agreement shall commence upon execution by all parties, and shall continue through December 31, 2026, unless terminated earlier in accordance with the provisions set forth herein.

4. Compensation

The Township shall compensate Consultant at the rate of **Sixty-Five (\$65.00) Dollars per hour**, provided that total compensation under this Agreement shall not exceed **Ten Thousand (\$10,000.00) Dollars** without prior written amendment approved by the Township governing body, where required by law.

Authorized reimbursable expenses shall be limited to:

- a. Mileage at applicable IRS rates;
- b. Postage;
- c. Reproductions; and
- d. Direct legal notice costs or other direct costs approved in advance by the Township.

Invoices shall be submitted monthly and shall itemize hours worked, tasks performed, dates of service, personnel performing the work, hourly rates, and approved reimbursable expenses.

5. Independent Contractor

Consultant is and shall at all times remain an independent contractor and not an employee, servant, agent, partner, or representative of the Township. Nothing contained in this Agreement shall be construed to create an employer-employee relationship between the Township and Consultant, or between the Township and any officer, employee, agent, subcontractor, or representative of Consultant. Consultant shall have no authority to bind the Township, incur obligations on behalf of the Township, or represent that Consultant has authority to act on behalf of the Township except as expressly authorized in writing by the Township.

Consultant shall be solely responsible for the manner and means by which the services are performed, subject to the Township's right to review the work for compliance with this Agreement. Consultant shall be responsible for all wages, salaries, payroll taxes, income taxes, unemployment insurance, workers' compensation insurance, disability insurance, benefits, pension contributions, withholdings, and other obligations relating to Consultant and Consultant's employees, agents, representatives, and subcontractors.

Consultant acknowledges and agrees that neither Consultant nor Consultant's employees, agents, representatives, or subcontractors shall be entitled to receive from the Township any employee benefits, including without limitation health insurance, paid leave, pension benefits, workers'

compensation benefits, unemployment benefits, or other benefits available to Township employees.

6. Standard of Performance

Consultant shall perform all services in a professional, timely, competent, and workmanlike manner consistent with generally accepted standards applicable to grant management and professional consulting services. Consultant shall exercise reasonable care, skill, diligence, and judgment in the performance of services and shall promptly correct, at Consultant's own expense, any errors, omissions, deficiencies, or nonconforming work caused by Consultant's negligent acts, errors, omissions, or failure to comply with this Agreement.

7. Compliance With Law

Consultant shall comply with all applicable federal, state, county, and local laws, rules, regulations, ordinances, executive orders, grant requirements, funding agency requirements, and Township policies applicable to the services, including but not limited to:

- a. The provisions of the New Jersey Local Public Contracts Law;
- b. New Jersey Business Registration requirements;
- c. Political Contribution Disclosure requirements;
- d. Affirmative Action and Equal Employment Opportunity requirements;
- e. All applicable federal and state grant administration, procurement, reporting, retention, and compliance regulations; and
- f. Any applicable conflict of interest, ethics, confidentiality, and public record requirements.

8. Records and Audit

Consultant shall maintain complete and accurate books, records, invoices, time records, correspondence, grant materials, supporting documentation, and other records related to the services performed and expenditures billed under this Agreement. Consultant shall make such records available to the Township, the Township's auditor, the State of New Jersey, any applicable funding agency, or any other governmental authority having jurisdiction, upon reasonable request and during normal business hours.

9. Ownership of Work Product

Any grant applications, reports, strategies, submissions, data, memoranda, correspondence, forms, drafts, recommendations, analyses, schedules, records, or other work product prepared, developed, created, or assembled by Consultant in connection with this Agreement shall be the property of the Township upon creation, whether or not the work is completed. Consultant may retain copies for its records, subject to any applicable confidentiality, public records, grant, or legal requirements. Consultant shall not use Township work product for any purpose unrelated to this Agreement without the Township's prior written consent.

10. Confidentiality

Consultant shall maintain the confidentiality of all non-public, privileged, proprietary, security-sensitive, personnel, financial, or otherwise confidential information obtained from or on behalf of the Township in connection with this Agreement. Consultant shall not disclose such information except as necessary to perform services under this Agreement, as authorized by the Township, or as required by law. This obligation shall survive the expiration or termination of this Agreement.

11. Indemnification

To the fullest extent permitted by law, Consultant shall defend, indemnify, and hold harmless the Township, including its governing body, officers, officials, employees, agents, and representatives, from and against any and all claims, demands, liabilities, causes of action, suits, damages, penalties, fines, judgments, losses, costs, and expenses, including reasonable attorneys' fees, court costs, consultant fees, expert fees, and costs of enforcement, arising out of or relating to Consultant's negligent acts or omissions, intentional misconduct, criminal acts, breach of this Agreement, or violation of applicable law in connection with the performance of this Agreement. This indemnification obligation shall not apply to the extent a claim is caused by the sole negligence, intentional misconduct, or criminal acts of the Township. The obligations under this section shall survive the expiration or termination of this Agreement.

12. Insurance

The parties represent that each is insured for liability purposes and agree to remain insured for so long as this Agreement remains in effect. The parties agree, to the extent possible under the terms of their respective insurance coverages, to name each other as additional insured on such policies of insurances to protect against liability arising from the provision of services under this Agreement, and to maintain such coverages throughout the duration of this Agreement.

13. Conflicts of Interest

Consultant represents that it has no conflict of interest that would impair its ability to perform services for the Township. Consultant shall promptly disclose to the Township any actual, potential, or perceived conflict of interest that arises during the term of this Agreement. Consultant shall not represent or assist any person or entity in a matter directly adverse to the Township in connection with the services provided under this Agreement without the Township's prior written consent.

14. Termination

The Township may terminate this Agreement:

- a. On thirty (30) days' written notice to Consultant without cause;

- b. Immediately upon written notice for cause, including but not limited to Consultant's breach of this Agreement, failure to perform, failure to maintain insurance, violation of law, conflict of interest, loss of required authorization, or conduct detrimental to the Township's interests;
- c. If funding is unavailable, not appropriated, reduced, withdrawn, or otherwise insufficient; or
- d. If the services are no longer required by the Township.

15. Non-Assignment

Consultant shall not assign, transfer, delegate, subcontract, or otherwise dispose of this Agreement or any rights, duties, or obligations hereunder without the prior written consent of the Township.

16. Notices

Notices hereunder shall be given to the Parties set forth below and shall be made by hand delivery, facsimile, overnight delivery or by regular mail. If given by regular mail, the notice shall be deemed to have been given within a required time if deposited in the U.S. Mail, postage prepaid, within the specified time limit. For the purpose of calculating time limits, which run from the giving of a particular notice, the time shall be calculated from actual receipt of the notice. This Agreement shall be governed by and construed in accordance with the laws of the State of New Jersey. Any action arising out of or relating to this Agreement shall be venued in the Superior Court of New Jersey, Law Division, Cape May County.

18. No Waiver

The failure of the Township to enforce any provision of this Agreement shall not constitute a waiver of that provision or of the Township's right to enforce that provision or any other provision in the future.

19. Severability

If any provision of this Agreement is held invalid, illegal, or unenforceable, the remaining provisions shall remain in full force and effect to the maximum extent permitted by law.

20. Entire Agreement

This Agreement, together with the incorporated proposal, constitutes the entire agreement between the parties. In the event of a conflict between this Agreement and Consultant's proposal, this Agreement shall control. This Agreement may be amended only by a written instrument authorized and executed by the parties in accordance with applicable law.

WHEREAS, due to the anticipated number of attendees at these community-wide events, and in order to maintain appropriate municipal services within the area of these events without a concomitant decrease in services elsewhere in the Township, the Township deems it necessary and appropriate to request the services of County resources, personnel, and/or equipment during these scheduled community-wide events; and

WHEREAS, the Township Council of the Township of Lower desires to enter into a Shared Services Agreement with the County of Cape May in order to utilize County resources and services at community-wide events through December 31, 2026.

SHARED SERVICES AGREEMENT

THIS SHARED SERVICES AGREEMENT (hereinafter "Agreement") is entered into this _____ day of _____, 2026, by and between the COUNTY OF CAPE MAY (hereinafter "County"), a body public and corporate of the State of New Jersey, having administrative offices at 4 Moore Road, Cape May Court House, New Jersey 08210 and the TOWNSHIP OF LOWER, a municipal corporation of the State of New Jersey, having its administrative offices at 2600 Bayshore Road, Villas, New Jersey, 08251 (the "Township"). The County and Township are referred to collectively as the "Parties."

WHEREAS, the Uniform Shared Services and Consolidation Act, N.J.S.A. 40A:65-1, et seq. (the "Act") authorizes and encourages local governmental units to enter into agreements for the pooling of resources and sharing of services, with an aim of reducing property taxes through the reduction of local expenses; and

WHEREAS, the Township hosts various community-wide events, including but not limited to concerts, festivals, races, and other events (the "Special Events"), that require or would benefit from additional resources, personnel and/or equipment from outside entities or agencies so as to provide a safe and controlled environment for participating members of the public; and

WHEREAS, due to the anticipated number of attendees at Special Events, and in order to provide appropriate municipal services within the area of these events without a concomitant decrease in services elsewhere in the Township, it is necessary for the Township to request the services of County resources, personnel and/or equipment (the "County Resources"); and

WHEREAS, the County Resources, as set forth with greater specificity in Schedule "A" annexed hereto, may be available at the request of the Township to ensure public safety at these various Special Events in a cost-efficient manner.

NOW, THEREFORE, for and in consideration of the exchange of mutual covenants and conditions and such other consideration as is set forth in this Agreement and as authorized by the provisions of N.J.S.A. 40A:65-1, et seq., the County and Township agree as follows:

1. Incorporation of Preamble. All of the provisions of the preamble that are set forth above are repeated and incorporated herein by this reference thereto as if set forth at length.

2. County Resources to Be Provided.

- a. The Township may request County Resources for a Special Events no less than seven (7) days prior thereto. Such request shall be made to the County Administrator, with a copy to County Counsel, for dissemination as appropriate to the County Departments maintaining or providing the requested County Resources.
- b. So long as such County Resources are available and are not necessary or then being utilized for County purposes or in aid of County programs, the County agrees to provide the requested County Resources (or as many of the County Resources as may be available) for the Special Event.
- c. The unit cost and/or hourly rate for various County Resources which may be requested to assist with a Special Event is set forth on Schedule "A" annexed hereto.

3. Consideration.

- a. The Township agrees to pay, and the County agrees to accept, the unit costs and/or hourly rates specified on Schedule "A" for the County Resources provided by the County to the Township for the Special Event.
- b. It is expressly understood and agreed upon by the Parties that the Township has requested the County Resources and the County has agreed to provide the County Resources to the Township for the Special Event(s). Notwithstanding any agreement between the Township and any third-party event organizer or sponsor, the Township is obligated to pay the County for the County Resources provided for Special Event hereunder. The Township understands and acknowledges that the County will not accept any third-party payment for the County Resources provided hereunder. The Township further acknowledges that the Township's obligation to pay for the County Resources hereunder shall in no manner be excused or delayed as a result of issues arising between the Township and any third-party event organizer, including without limitation a delay in any reimbursement for these services to the Township by any such third-party.

- c. Upon the conclusion of each Special Event for which County Resources are provided, the County Chief Financial Officer shall provide an invoice and properly executed purchase order to the Township Chief Financial Officer certifying the County Resources provided and services rendered. The Township shall pay the County for the County Resources provided within thirty (30) days of the presentation of the County's invoice and properly executed purchase order.

4. Insurance; Indemnification.

- a. The Parties represent that each is insured for liability purposes and agree to remain insured by for so long as this Agreement remains in effect. The Township specifically represents that it is self-insured. The Parties agree, to the extent possible under the terms of their respective insurance coverages, to name each other as additional insured on such policies of insurances to protect against liability arising from the provision of services under this Agreement, and to maintain such coverages throughout the duration of this Agreement.
- b. To the fullest extent permitted by law, and at its sole cost and expense, the Township hereby agrees to defend and indemnify the County and to hold it harmless from and against any and all damages, claims, losses, suits and/or liabilities of any sort (including reasonable attorney's fees and litigation costs) arising out of or alleging to arise out of the performance of this Agreement, including claims of negligence against the County, so long as any damages, claims, losses, suits and/or liabilities are not sustained due to the sole negligence, willful misconduct or criminal actions of the County.
- c. The Parties hereto agree, however, that as to Workers' Compensation insurance, County employees providing services hereunder shall be deemed to be only the County's employees, without regard to whether they are providing a service to the Township in furtherance of the purpose and intent of this Agreement. Moreover, nothing in this Agreement shall be interpreted as forming an employer-employee relationship between the Township and the County employees that are temporarily assigned to duty for the Special Event pursuant to the terms of this Agreement.

5. Operational Requirements for County Resources. The County Emergency Management Coordinator, or his designee, in connection with the head of the County Department(s) providing the County Resources required or requested by the Township hereunder, shall be the County points of contact (the "County Contacts") for all operational issues pertaining to the Township's access to or use of the County Resources. The County Contacts shall be informed of and invited to participate in any planning, logistical, or scheduling meetings pertaining to the Special Events for which County Resources are requested.

6. Effective Date; Termination. This Agreement shall be approved by and be deemed effective on the date of a resolution of the governing bodies of the County and the Township duly adopted in accordance with law at public meetings held in accordance with the provisions of the Open Public Meetings Act and the provisions of the Uniform Shared Services and Consolidation Act. The term of this Agreement shall run from its effective date through December 31, 2025.

7. Miscellaneous.
 - a. This Agreement shall be governed by the laws of the State of New Jersey. In the event of a dispute arising out of this Agreement, the Parties agree that they immediately will meet and make a good faith effort to resolve said dispute. In the event that the dispute cannot be resolved amicably, then any litigation arising out of this Agreement shall be litigated in the Superior Court of New Jersey, Cape May County.

 - b. The Parties have read this Agreement and it is a full statement of their understandings. This Agreement is not subject to oral modification and may only be changed by a writing approved, adopted and executed with the same formalities as were attendant to the approval, adoption and execution of this Agreement.

 - c. The headings contained in this Agreement are for reference purposes only and shall not affect the meaning or interpretation of the substantive provisions of this Agreement.

 - d. The County and the Township agree that no inference concerning the meaning or interpretation of this Agreement shall be drawn based upon the fact that it was drafted by the County of Cape May's legal counsel.

Title: AN ORDINANCE REPEALING CHAPTER 7, TRAFFIC, ARTICLE IV, PAID PARKING ZONES/PARKING METERS, OF THE CODE OF THE TOWNSHIP OF LOWER, AND SPECIFICALLY REPEALING ORDINANCE #2026-04 AND ORDINANCE #2026-08

WHEREAS, pursuant to N.J.S.A. 40:48-2, the Township Council of the Township of Lower is authorized to make, amend, repeal, and enforce ordinances necessary and proper for the good government of the Township and for the protection of the public health, safety and welfare of its inhabitants; and

WHEREAS, on March 16, 2026, Township Council adopted Ordinance #2026-04 enacting Chapter 7, Traffic, Article IV, establishing Paid Parking Zones/Parking Meters and associated regulations; and

WHEREAS, on April 20, 2026, Township Council adopted Ordinance #2026-08 amending Chapter 7, Traffic, Article IV, Paid Parking Zones/Parking Meters, to establish rules and regulations associated with the issuance of paid parking permits; and

WHEREAS, Township Council, in consultation with the Manager's Office and Township professionals, and after receiving comments and concerns from members of the public, has determined that it is necessary and appropriate, and in the public interest, to repeal Ordinance #2026-04 and Ordinance #2026-08 in their entirety.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT ORDAINED by the Township Council of the Township of Lower, County of Cape May, State of New Jersey as follows:

Section 1. Chapter 7, Traffic, Article IV, Paid Parking Zones/Parking Meters, of the Code of the Township of Lower, as enacted by Ordinance #2026-04 and amended by Ordinance #2026-08, is hereby repealed in its entirety.

Section 2. Ordinance #2026-04 and Ordinance #2026-08 are likewise repealed in their entirety.

Section 3. All other ordinances or parts of ordinances in conflict with or inconsistent with this Ordinance are hereby repealed to the extent of such conflict or inconsistency.

Section 4. Should any section, paragraph, sentence, clause, or phrase of this Ordinance be declared unconstitutional or invalid for any reason, the remaining portions of this Ordinance shall not be affected thereby and shall remain in full force and effect, and to this end the provisions of this Ordinance are hereby declared to be severable.

Section 5. This Ordinance shall become effective twenty (20) days after final passage and publication according to law.
